Speaker Bios

Brian Caffo, PhD

Keynote Speaker

Brian Caffo, PhD is a professor in the Department of Biostatistics with a secondary appointment in the Department of Biomedical Engineering at Johns Hopkins University. He graduated from the University of Florida Department of Statistics in 2001. He has worked in statistical computing, statistical modeling, computational statistics, multivariate and decomposition methods and statistics in neuroimaging and neuroscience. He led teams that won the ADHD 200 prediction competition. He co-directs the SMART statistical group. With other faculty at JHU, he created and co-directs the Coursera Data Science Specialization, a 10 course specialization on statistical data analysis. He co-directs the JHU Data Science Lab, a group dedicated to open educational innovation and data science. He is the former director of the Biostatistics graduate programs and admissions committees. He is currently the co-director of the Johns Hopkins High Performance Computing Exchange super computing service center and past-president of the Bloomberg School of Public Health faculty senate.

He is the retired Clinical Director of the Allegheny County Department of Human Services and the retired Deputy-Director of Children Youth and Families. He is the past executive director of Family Resources, a large child abuse prevention and treatment non profit organization in Pittsburgh.

Sandra Caffo, LCSW

Sandra Caffo is a retired Licensed Clinical Social Worker with a 40-year career applying systems thinking in clinical work, teaching, and business. She earned an undergraduate degree in social work from the University of Dayton and an MSW from Wayne State University, in a systems-thinking graduate program. Ms. Caffo's early career included work in public welfare, child welfare, and criminal justice, followed by a transition to academia as an Assistant Professor at the University of Toledo. She also taught at the University of Pittsburgh Graduate School of Social Work and its Post Graduate Certificate Program in Marriage and Family Therapy. Ms. Caffo began studying Bowen Family Systems Theory in 1986 and has remained active in the Western Pennsylvania Family Center, through teaching, presenting, and as a faculty member. She established a clinical practice, became licensed as a Marriage and Family Therapist and was an Approved Supervisor for the American Association of Marriage and Family Therapy. In 2003, she joined Life Solutions EAP, where she advanced to Senior Director, managing Employee Assistance Program services for UPMC and other organizations.

He has studied Bowen Family Systems Theory for over 30 years, and has done many presentations on different applications of the theory, both in Pittsburgh and elsewhere.
